EPCH, which is a premier organisation for promotion of Indian Handicrafts, has organized the visit of Pakistani craftpersons for this Haat to enable them to interact closely with the Indian counterparts so that both have enriching experience for devising and developing new product lines.

The O/o Development Commissioner (Handicrafts) has provided financial support for this craft exchange programme. The Dastkari Haat Samiti has organized the Dastkari Haat Bazar including participation of Indian craftpersons and display of Indian merchandise and coordination with the Pakistani NGO.

While addressing the Dastkari Haat Bazar, Mr. Salman Bashir, High Commissioner of Pakistan in India, stated that, "this Bazaar can be a starting point for dismantling the barriers between India and Pakistan and with the New Year will begin a new chapter in collaboration between the two countries in the field of Handicrafts."


